The Farm, Food & Beyond: Our Commitment to Sustainability initiative, was just launched by farm and food industry leaders in Ontario. By expanding the scope into a whole farm sustainability plan, this project addresses not only environmental practices but also economic and social issues important for sustainability. Support for Ontario's agriculture community

The Ontario government is a strong supporter of the agri-food industry. Through programs and funding such as the Local Food Fund, the <u>Rural Economic Development</u> program and the <u>Premier's Award for Agri-Food Innovation Excellence</u>, members of the agri-food sector have been able to develop new products, promote new innovations, enter international markets, create jobs and improve their local communities.

About farming in Ontario

Ontario has a large and diverse agricultural sector with more than 125 different types of crops and livestock raised on family farms across the province. Here are some more facts about farming in Ontario.

Who are we and how big are we?

- Number of farm operators: 74,840 (2011)
- Total number of farms: 51, 950 (2011)
- Total cropland in hectares: 3,613,821 (2011)

Sustainability on our farms

• More than 35,000 Ontario farm families have completed Environmental Farm Plans. This represents both commitments by individual farmers and successful farmer-government processes.

- Ontario's farmers have just launched a new *Farm, Food & Beyond: Our Commitment to Sustainability* agenda. Learn more at <u>www.sustainablefarms.ca</u>.
- A significant and growing portion of Ontario farm produce is used to develop bio-based products other than foods. Examples include starch sizing, derived from corn, which is used for paper coatings and adhesives, and oilseed-derived lubricants and paints.
- Ontario-grown wheat straw is providing the fibre portion of polymer-composite materials used to manufacture automobile components and other consumer and industrial products.
- In 1901, three million Canadian farmers produced food for five million Canadians. Canadian statistics show 0.3 million farmers now produce food for over 35 million Canadians.
- For every dollar spent shopping at a farmers' market, another two dollars ripples through the provincial economy. In Ontario alone, sales at farmers' markets totalled almost \$600 million, leading to an economic impact of an astounding \$1.8 billion.

What do we grow and produce?

- Corn is the most common field crop grown in Ontario. It is an ingredient in more than 3,000 grocery products.
- Over 125 different fruit and vegetable crops are grown in Ontario with an estimated annual farm gate value of \$1.2 billion.
- Greenhouse vegetables are the largest sector of the vegetable industry, with an estimated annual farm gate value of \$450 million. Ontario is North America's biggest greenhouse vegetable producer with 1,800 acres under glass.
- Ontario's cattle and beef sector supports more than 11,000 jobs and contribute approximately \$4 billion to the province's economy.
- Dairy is the largest sector of Ontario agriculture. There are 4,000 dairy farmers and 270,000 milking cows producing 2.5 billion litres of milk per year, enough to fill the Rogers Centre twice.
- In terms of major fruit crops, grapes are grown on the largest amount of land at 7,439 hectares.
- For major vegetable crops, potatoes are grown on the largest amount of land at 15,129 hectares.
- Ontario farmers currently supply 65% of the ingredients used by Ontario food processors.
- Egg farming in Ontario provides 6,247 jobs and contributes \$562 million to the GDP.
- There are 176 turkey farmers in the province of Ontario raising about 45% of all the turkeys in Canada.
- Ontario has more than 1,000 farmers raising 200 million chickens grown annually. The industry contributes \$2.72 billion to the Ontario economy and supports 19,183 full-time equivalent jobs.
- There are 28,000 grain farmers in Ontario growing barley, corn, oats, soybeans and wheat, on six million acres of farm land across the province.
- There are approximately 1,524 pork producers in the province of Ontario that marketed 4.97 million hogs in 2014. This contributed \$867 million to the GDP and is responsible for 15,814 full-time jobs.
- More than 70% of Ontario farm products remain within the province.
- Agriculture contributes \$13.7 billion to Ontario's annual GDP.

Other Ontario agriculture facts and statistics:

- Ontario loses an average of 350 acres of farmland every day.
- Rural Ontario is home to 70% of Ontario's farm sector employment.

- In the province of Ontario, there are three agri-food jobs waiting for each graduate with a university degree and two agri-food jobs for every diploma graduate.
- 158,000 jobs are generated by agriculture and agri food sector.
- Food processing directly employs more than 91,000 workers across Ontario.
