Life is complicated – but Marion Markham Kitchener and her activist friends like to ignore that fact.

Supporting Ontario and Canadian agriculture is one of the best ways to support our communities on a social, economic and environmental level. Conestoga Meats is a farmer cooperative that processes Ontario pork raised by Ontario farmers. Animal activists like Marion are fundamentally opposed to this, and rely on misinformation, generalizations and distortions to broadcast their message.

Environment Canada reports that, in 2015, Canadian agriculture accounted for less than 10 per cent (closer to 8 per cent) of this country's greenhouse gas emissions; emissions from livestock account for a fraction of that amount.

It's also worth noting that the information Marion sources from the United Nations' Food and Agriculture Organization was acknowledged as flawed, and revised by that same organization several years later. That analysis also makes no mention of the need to eliminate livestock altogether (that's something activists have dreamed up), and instead reiterates how improvements in technology and our scientific understanding can – and indeed do – help farmers drastically reduce negative environmental impacts.
