Chair's Message

2017 was a formative year for Farm & Food Care Ontario – and a true embodiment of what our founding organizations, OFAC and AGCare, set out to do thirty years ago.

Last winter, this organization began developing a Strategic Plan designed to identify our central goals, how those goals might be achieved, and how we can facilitate outreach, engagement and extension to better serve our agriculture partners. Member feedback was central to this process and ensured that the plan supports Ontario's farmers and agribusinesses.

As part of this Strategic Plan, Farm & Food Care Ontario continues to deliver and facilitate a range of farm environmental and animal-related projects and resources. Our water-use and soil management workshops, along with on-farm water management projects, continue to help farmers find practical ways to improve their resource management. Helping the wider agricultural community understand barriers to the adoption of better management practices also has wide-reaching implications.

As always, farm animal care initiatives also play a major role in this organization. In 2017, that meant establishing an online animal handling certificate course for new farm hires, developing a prototype in-barn fire prevention device specific to livestock farmers, and an improved understanding of rights, responsibilities, and relationships of farmers, commodity groups, and the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. New relationships were established with emergency responders through resources and training courses centred on livestock emergencies like truck rollovers and barn fires. These initiatives have proven to be an invaluable investment for all involved.

Supporting our partners during tough times has, perhaps, been one of the most significant aspects of our work throughout 2017. Indeed, activist, legal, and political pressures, as well as unforeseen accidents, are always best approached as a community. Such a collaborative approach has helped the Ontario farm community successfully tackle some of these issues while simultaneously providing a public voice for our sector.

And through it all, Farm & Food Care Ontario continues engaging in proactive outreach on an increasing scale. Members were very clear in vocalizing the fact that they continue to believe this is the most important role we serve – rating it a 9.4 out of 10 in level of importance.

Record numbers attended our Breakfast on the Farm events; a suite of eight new virtual farm tours - shot using 360-degree video - were launched: farm tours for food writers, culinary students, and Registered Dietitians are in higher demand than ever before. And of course, the fourth edition of The Real Dirt on Farming was also published in its most comprehensive form yet.

Indeed, the brand itself also expanded with the creation of our new sister organization. Farm & Food Care P.E.I., in addition to Farm & Food Care Saskatchewan.

Ontario's farming community has had to adapt to a number of challenges in the past year, and this organization is no exception. Our work is a delicate balance between proactive outreach and supporting our industry through both the good and the contentious. Despite this, we continue to achieve great things in connecting Canadians with their food, and making a difference for Ontario farmers.

It has been a privilege to work with such a dedicated, capable staff and Board of Directors.

Executive Director's

Message



I would have loved to have been an observer in the formative meetings that took place within Ontario agriculture in 1987 and early 1988.

I've heard quite a bit about those discussions, and about how farm leaders took the concept of public outreach and turned them into the Ontario Farm Animal Council and AGCare. At the time, that concept was leading edge - commodity groups putting aside their sector-specific work to collectively answer the questions of a non-farming public.

Little did those farm leaders know, they were creating made-in-Ontario models that have since been mirrored across North America and beyond. It is so gratifying to see many of them still involved in our organization today.

Six years ago, when OFAC and AGCare merged, Ontario was again seen as a trend setter. Successful sister groups have now been formed in Saskatchewan and Prince Edward Island, with additional interest coming from many other parts of Canada.

It's a coalition approach that I think is sometimes taken for granted now - at least here in Ontario - but it's still the envy of many.

Last year, for example, a Churchill Fellowship scholar from Adelaide, Australia, visited this organization as part of her studies. In her final report, she heaped high praise on the Farm & Food Care model, noting that Australia has "a large gap in organizations

devoted solely to building trust in agriculture and food producers." One of the key recommendations from her report is that "a cross-commodity organization focused on building trust needs to be established".

2017 also saw the loss of long-time supporter and former OFAC chair Jim Magee. In our final visit, he wagged his finger at me and challenged the entire Farm & Food Care team to keep up a high standard of doing guality, meaningful work. As he told me in that conversation. "We need Farm & Food Care now more than we ever have."

Many of us believe that statement to be true, and we're far from alone. Work being done nationally with the Public Trust Steering Committee, and discussions around Ontario's Presidents' Council tables, also echo Jim's sentiment.

I'm really proud of the work that our small but enthusiastic staff team accomplished in 2017 - you'll see highlights throughout this document in the areas of consumer outreach, farm animal care and environmental stewardship. And while we're first and foremost an Ontario organization, many of our projects – like the new FarmFood360 virtual reality website and the fourth edition of *The Real Dirt on* Farming – have national reach and relevance.

Thanks to you, Farm & Food Care Ontario members, partners, donors and volunteers. Our success is your success. We couldn't do what we do without you.







ENVIRONMENTAL PROJECTS & INITIATIVE

Sharps Pick-up & Disposal

In an effort to safely remove used veterinary sharps from farms, Farm & Food Care Ontario staff attended the Pork Congress in Stratford to assist Ontario Pork with a pilot program collecting used veterinary needles and sharps from attendees. In total, 36 large biohazard bags were collected for safe disposal. Similar initiatives with other commodity groups are being explored for 2018, with the goal of managing similar programs at other locations.

Timing Matters working group

Farm & Food Care Ontario is working with livestock commodity groups on a program of producer education and awareness surrounding the risks of runoff from winter spreading. This response is part of wider efforts to reduce risks of nutrient runoff as outlined in the Lake Erie Action Plan. The issue of winter manure spreading is being addressed through the OMAFRA-led Timing Matters working group. This pilot program in the Lake Erie watershed began in September, and runs through the winter season with Farm & Food Care Ontario acting as secretariat.

Understanding barriers to Best Management Practices

A Best Management Practices project was undertaken with OMAFRA to better understand farmer perspectives surrounding the barriers to soil BMP adoption. A stakeholder engagement and presentation meeting was held in October. To present the study results, a report on the findings of this project has been completed and is available online and to industry partners.

Farm environmental workshops

Two water use workshops and two soil health workshops were held for farmers in Eastern Ontario, in partnership with the Ontario Soil & Crop Improvement Association, the OMAFRA, and other community supporters. These workshops covered information about soil biology. reducing tillage losses, water retention strategies, and much more.

Water Smart Farm Projects

30 on-farm water-use efficiency projects were concluded in 2017. The Water Smart program was conducted in partnership with the provincial ministry of agriculture, and helped greenhouse growers, vegetable washers and livestock farmers reduce their water-use. In every case, this program helped growers reduce that use by at least 50 per cent. Case studies, videos, factsheets and other materials have also been created to highlight methods of water conservation for a wider farm audience.

FARM ANIMAL CARE PROJECTS & INITIATIVE

Livestock Transportation Emergencies

A livestock transportation emergencies project was initiated in 2017 with funding from the Agriculture Adaptation Council. A team of advisors was created to attend truck accidents involving livestock. This team took part in specialized training on animal handling and responder safety over a three day period. A resource guide based on the workshops and associated resources was also developed and distributed to 450 fire departments across the province. This was been a collaborative project with Beef Farmers of Ontario, transporters and emergency responders, and Farm & Food Care Ontario plans to continue this initiative with other partners.


Livestock Emergency Response Workshops

Farm & Food Care Ontario hosted two additional Emergency Livestock Training Workshops in collaboration with fire departments in Listowel and Glencoe. These were both fully attended with 35 to 40 at each session. The courses brought together emergency responders from different regions, plus many interested in learning more about animal behavior and management during livestock emergencies – such as truck roll overs and barn fires.

Animal Care Helpline

Farm & Food Care Ontario received over 60 calls to the Helpline in 2017 relating to beef and dairy cattle, pigs, poultry, and sheep. The Helpline is a "farmer helping farmer" service and responds to calls from people who think farm animals may need more care. Staff also met several times with managers from the Ontario Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to animals (OSPCA) to build relationships and help expedite action on calls referred through the Helpline.

Education and awareness through producer organizations about animal care and a better relationship between individual commodity groups and the OSPCA has served to reduce the number of instances where OSPCA officers are at a farm without proper information or background.

ANIMAL CARE CERTIFICATE

Farm & Food Care Ontario launched an Animal Care Certificate Program, based on the nationally developed Codes of Practice for six species and the previously developed IMPACT animal-handling resources. This training and certification is geared towards new hires who may be unfamiliar with animal handling, and is available free of charge until the end of May 2018. The program was launched in early September with six modules available online.

Representing farmer interests

In an effort to continue engaging in open dialogue and contributing the farmer voice to discussions of animal welfare and onfarm practices, staff attended the National Farm Animal Care Council conference and the Federation of Humane Societies conference in Ottawa in the past year.








Hot-spot barn fire research project

With partnership and funding from the Ontario Mutual Insurance Association and the Agricultural Adaptation Council, staff worked to develop a prototype in-barn fire prevention device. The prototype – which is capable of detecting rises in temperature in critical equipment before a fire ignites – is now undergoing in-barn testing and evaluation.

The Real Dirt on Farming

The fourth edition of *The Real Dirt on Farming* was unveiled in November 2017. Information in the resource has been revised and updated using a wide variety of credible and accessible sources, including Statistic Canada's 2016 Census of Agriculture and consumer research conducted by the Canadian Centre for Food Integrity.

The publication addresses common questions and misconceptions about Canadian food and farming, as well as other subjects that the general public has indicated are important to them. All major commodities are covered, along with hot-topic subjects including GMOs, pesticide use, and more. Commodity groups, government experts, researchers, veterinarians and more were asked to participate in the review process to ensure all information is as accurate as possible. A full 60-page publication is currently available online at RealDirtonFarming.ca. A shorter digest version, as well as French translations, are also available.

FARM FOOD 360°



FarmFood 360

Using 360 cameras and virtual reality technology, the FarmFood 360 website gives Canadians the chance to tour real, working farms and food processing plants, all without putting on boots. Eight new tours featuring mink, sheep, an egg farm and egg processor, cheese and milk processor, grain, and dairy farms were all added in 2017. These tours were featured alongside *The Real Dirt on Farming* and the Ontario Federation of Agriculture at a joint booth during the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair. FarmFood 360° is the latest rendition of Farm & Food Care Ontario's highly successful Virtual Farm Tours program – which began in 2006. Interviews with farmers and processing plant employees about food safety, animal husbandry, environmental stewardship and more have also been included in many of the new 360 degree tours. These tours were sponsored by Ontario Sheep Farmers, the Canadian Mink Breeders Association, Gray Ridge Egg Farms, Gay Lea Foods Co-operative Ltd., CropLife Canada, and Dairy Farmers of Canada.

PUBLIC OUTREACH & FARM COMMUNITY SUPPORT ONTINUE

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Breakfast on the Farm is Farm & Food Care Ontario's largest and most popular public event series. 4,000 people and over 250 volunteers visited Ontario farms during two Breakfast on the Farm events in the summer of 2017. 2,500 people attended the June 24 event at the Donkers family's Shedden-area dairy goat farm. The second event took place on the Johnston family's dairy farm (Maplevue Holsteins) near Listowel on September 16, with 1,500 people visiting the farm throughout the day.





Two food influencer tours in Toronto and Ottawa, one culinary student tour in London, and two tours for Registered Dietitians in Toronto and Kingston were held in 2017. In total, 50 Registered Dietitians, 100 food writers, and 35 culinary students participated. Proactive action

Communications & media training


