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FFCO Livestock Truck Rollover Training – 2024 on-line course (in person also available)

This online (Zoom) course is designed for first responders (fire, police), truckers, farmer/truckers and others in the livestock emergency services field. It provides detailed information to better prepare responders for accidents involving livestock trailers. It is offered on scheduled dates or as a custom course for any group, (minimum 10, and maximum 30 participants per session) to allow for dialog and interaction with the instructor.

Transport accidents involving livestock trailers present unique challenges for first responders. Animals that are injured, trapped or loose on the roadway as the result of vehicular accidents require special safety considerations.

Experience has shown that responders with livestock emergency training can more confidently respond to these situations in an organized and safe manner while minimizing the overall time on scene.

Farm animal rescue expert Victor MacPherson delivers this course. Designed for first responders and emergency personnel the course covers Farm Animals on the Loose and Truck Accidents, focusing on trailer design and the implications for safe extrication, containment and transport. Course sections address animal behaviour, laws and regulations, euthanasia protocols, and how to develop your local response plan.

This PowerPoint and video course will cover:

- Incident command and adaptive management when there is livestock
- Animal behaviour (lights, sirens and reflective turn out gear may not be great on scene)
- Trailer design and the implications for extrication points
- Laws and regulations
- Euthanasia protocols, veterinary and police responsibilities
- How to develop response plans, including templates and examples of guides

By the end of the course you will know:

- O What makes livestock truck rollovers different? Where do I look for assistance?
- What preplanning can be done to manage a livestock truck rollover?
- o Do I cut first or wait for a containment/transport plan?
- O What are we going to do with these animals?
- Where to cut? Where not to cut? How to cut a good door vs. a bad door
